PRESIDENT'S REPORT: NEW DIRECTORS JOIN BOARD

Dear Brothers,

The past 12 months have comprised a clear building year for the Gamma Chapter House Association. In October 2009, the association installed a new board. In the ensuing months, that board has developed a strategic focus on issues that will enhance the viability of the Gamma Chapter House as a first-class residence for our undergraduate fraternity members for years to come. At the same time, board member Mike Weiss '06 started an alumni involvement committee designed to create events and services that are specifically crafted to add value to a continued commitment by alumni members of the association.

Separately, board member Steve Hall '56 completed several years of effort to create an endowment fund structure to help subsidize capital improvements in the years ahead. Thirty-one brothers from the '40s, '50s, and '60s provided seed money for the initial phase. The brothers of the future will owe a debt of gratitude, to all those who

stepped up with contributions, for their vision. Along with our regular final list of donors, we have included a separate list of all the brothers who chose to support this new fund for the benefit of future generations of Phi Sigs.

Looking to 2010–2011, we have three new directors joining the board of the Gamma Chapter House Association. Bob Chase '59, Steve Fontana '79, and "Chick" Ver Valen '52 are all leaving the board, but will be joining a committee specifically involved in guiding some of the significant capital improvements that will be needed in the near future. They chose to move in this direction for a variety of reasons, but they all deserve our thanks for their efforts in guiding the chapter.

The three new directors provide the board with additional perspective on how to manage the association. Dan Satnick '12 is the current president of the undergraduate brotherhood. Dan has been managing the chapter since December of last year. He

speaks with authority for the undergraduate brothers and knows firsthand what areas of the house need attention.

The next new director is Kris Reichardt '06. While at Cornell, he was a member of the Greek honor society, Order of Omega, and Navy ROTC, and a staff writer for the *Daily Sun*. Upon graduation, Kris was commissioned an ensign, and after two deployments in support of the Global War on Terror and serving with NATO maritime forces, he completed a department head tour with the cyclone patrol, conducting maritime patrol and anti-piracy operations.

Upon release from active duty in June 2010, Kris returned to Ithaca to pursue a Master of Industrial and Labor Relations degree at the NYS ILR School. Having returned to Ithaca, he provides us with a perspective that combines his relatively recent graduation with day-to-day access to the house, so that he can respond to any

AN IMPORTANT UPDATE REGARDING RUSH PROCEDURES

Gentlemen:

As you may be aware, sweeping changes are coming to the Greek system. Dean Kent Hubble, Vice President Susan Murphy, and Assistant Dean of Students Travis Apgar have proposed three bullet points to add in to the university's recognition policy. They removed alcohol from new member recruitment and education, while examining Cornell's anti-hazing policies.

As the rush chairs of Phi Sigma Kappa, we are now looking into alternative methods of recruitment, both in the fall semester and during Rush Week itself. While the

changes are staggered, we want to make sure we assimilate ourselves to handle these impending changes. For 2009–10, we recruited 23 new men, and hope to have a similar result this year. However, in addition to traditional recruitment methods, we have begun to brainstorm alternative and creative recruitment strategies.

We are taking philanthropy very seriously, not only creating our own events, but advocating participation in all other fraternity and sorority philanthropy events. With our letters more visible on campus, we are more likely to attract attention.

We also have a committee to brainstorm events once Rush Week does go dry. We are looking into paintball, go-carting, and other non-alcoholic events available around the time of rush week. Discussions will continue as the changes draw closer.

ALUMNUS SPOTLIGHT ON MICHAEL FINLEY '73

Michael Finley came to Cornell from Staten Island, New York, in 1969, alongside his two good friends, John Aruny '73 and Alfonso Fressola '73. With no intention of joining a fraternity initially, the trio ended up joining Phi Sigma Kappa together. Michael graduated four years later in 1973 with a degree in mathematics, but not before living in Phi Sig's house for three years; holding the positions of rush chair, inductor, and vice president; and completing four years of Navy ROTC.

Michael was far from alone, as many brothers of Phi Sig were in Navy ROTC, though the college riots across the nation—and specifically at Cornell in the early 1970s—made it a difficult time to be in ROTC. Nevertheless, he was prepared for a job in the Navy upon graduation in 1973, as the Vietnam War was coming to a close. Michael attended minesweeper school in Charleston, South Carolina, and then continued on to Guam, where he met the Minesweeper USS Engage (MSO-433) and stayed in the Pacific for about a year. Michael would continue his studies several years later at the Naval Postgraduate

School in Monterey, California, where he graduated with a Master of Science degree with distinction in operations research. He was also awarded the Chief of Naval Operations Award for Excellence in Operations Research, and was thus admitted to the Scientific Honorary Society. Michael also served on the USS Gato (SSN-615), a nuclear submarine, and two aircraft carriers. In addition, he had numerous shore assignments around the country, as well as a number of assignments in Washington, D.C.

More would come out of Michael's time in the Navy than a series of schools, ships, and shore duty. In 1977, he met his wife-to-be, Lindyll, at the Navy Ships Parts Control Center in Mechanicsburg, Pennsylvania. They were married three years later at Carlisle Army War College. They would go on to have a son, Edward, who would follow his father's footsteps by attending Cornell University, graduating in 2008.

All in all, Michael spent around 30 years in the Navy, traveling frequently. In 1990, he was on the USS Dwight D. Eisenhower (CVN 69), which was located in the Mediterranean

Sea at the time. On August 2, Saddam Hussein invaded Kuwait, beginning the Persian Gulf War, and the Eisenhower's proximity to the area prompted Michael's immediate involvement in Operation Desert Shield, where he was in charge of battle group logistics. His time in the Navy came to a close in 2003, when he retired having acquired the rank of two-star admiral.

Following his retirement in the Navy, Michael began working for PRTM Management Consultants. He is now a partner in the firm, and in fact, five of the 100 partners at the firm are Cornell Alumni. (They recruit at Cornell, have about 20 CU alumni in the firm, and would happily employ more—hint, hint!) Although both his time in the Navy and his work for the firm have given him the privilege to travel extensively, he currently lives in Annapolis, Maryland, which he is happy to call home. Mike stays in touch with Bill Miller '73, Jim Felley '73, Tom Scarpelli '73, Fred Brunk '73, and John Aruny '73.

emergencies that might develop over the school year.
